SUBJECT: TERMINATION OF LOCAL EMERGENCY PROCLAMATION

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

That the City Council terminate the Proclamation of Local Emergency.

ISSUE:

A Proclamation of Local Emergency is required to be reviewed by City Council at every meeting in order to remain in effect in accordance with Municipal Code Chapter 2.20, "Emergency Organization", and Government Code Section 8630.

BACKGROUND:

On January 10 and 11, 2005, the City of Dana Point experienced slippage, mudslides and landslides in various areas of the City, due to recent storms and rain affecting the Southern California region. On January 11, 2005 there was a failure in the San Juan Creek channel levy, resulting in the evacuation of residents from portions of the Cities of San Juan Capistrano and Dana Point. As a result of these issues, and under the authority given to him by Dana Point Municipal Code Section 2.20.050, the Director of Emergency Services signed a proclamation declaring a local emergency for the City of Dana Point.

On January 17, 2005, the City Council approved a resolution ratifying the proclamation of the existence of a local emergency due to the effects of recent winter storms.

DISCUSSION:

Most of the damage caused to public property as a result of the recent storms has been repaired and/or cleaned up and services restored. While some recovery and restoration

work may continue into the future, it is no longer necessary to continue the proclamation of emergency that was prompted by the recent storms. Cost recovery efforts will continue in coordination with the County, State and Federal Governments to seek reimbursement for City expenditures in response to the storms. At this time, Staff is recommending that the proclamation of local emergency due to the Winter storms be "terminated.

FISCAL IMPACT:

City Staff is working with Orange County Emergency Management, The Governor's Office of Emergency Services (OES), and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to recover costs associated with the clean up and repair of damage during the storms to publicly owned/operated property.
